Oklahoma Baptist Disaster Relief (DR) volunteers were in action responding to the outbreak of tornadoes in Oklahoma in late April and early May.

Oklahoma Baptist DR has been serving in hard-hit areas of the state, including Sulphur and Morris. On the morning of May 7, DR volunteers were serving in Barnsdall and Bartlesville to assess damage from devastating tornadoes the evening before.

According to Jason Yarbrough, state director for DR, teams serving have “seen significant fruit” while serving.

“We are trained, prepared and equipped to be able to serve people and communities at this great hour of need, all to demonstrate the love of Jesus,” said Yarbrough. “As we have been able to serve in the areas of debris clean-up, chainsaw work and meal preparation, we are also having Gospel conversations.”

Yarbrough, who said Oklahoma Baptist DR has averaged 170 volunteers serving daily, noted that there have been the following spiritual decisions/results:

- Three people have made a profession of faith;
- 40 Gospel conversations;
- 175 ministry contacts;
- 300 chaplain contacts; and
- 60 Bibles distributed.

In addition to this, Oklahoma Baptist DR has prepared 8,000 meals, offered 300 showers and done 140 loads of laundry. The ministry has received more than 150 requests for assistance across the state, to which they continue to respond.




2024 Women's Retreat inspires participants

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WHAT IS A CHURCH REPLANTER?

You may have heard the term “jack of all trades, but master of none.”

You may not have heard the seemingly less flattering phrase “equipped with knives all over, yet none are sharp.”

Some days, these phrases are applied to church planters. Yet neither of these truly describe the qualities of a church planter—or what I am describing here as a Church Replanter.

The term “Resourceful Generalist” is accurate. Let me explain. In the area of Replanting, a Resourceful Generalist is someone who leads out in various facets of church life with proficiency.

The Replanter will preach, teach, prepare and administrate budgets. The Replanter will formulate church calendars, supervise staff, give biblical guidance and counsel, lead meetings, cast vision, and perform many other administrative and spiritual leadership duties.

JimBo Stewart, associate director of replant at the North American Mission Board (NAMB) calls the work of replanting “a gritty and glorious work.” Unfortunately dying churches are often settling for “what they can get” when it comes to a pastor, feeling that they are unable to hire a top-shelf pastor to lead them back to health. According to Stewart, there is a new trend of God calling some top-notch men to the work of replanting. Instead of settling for mediocrity, struggling churches are increasingly embracing the prospect of transformation under capable leadership.

NAMB’s Replant Team has identified the following 13 essential characteristics of effective replanters:

Visionary Shepherd

Tactical Patience

Gospel Orientation

Initiative

Missional Focus

Emotional Intelligence

Organizational Awareness

Affinity for Multi-Generational Ministry

Pastoral Grit

Respect for a Church’s Legacy

Spousal Perseverance

Resourceful Generalist

Willingness to Confront

In Oklahoma, there is fervent prayer for God to call more and more men with these characteristics and the biblical qualifications of a pastor to the glorious work of replanting dying churches in our state. These servant-leaders are seen as catalysts for the advancement of the Gospel in communities where its light has dimmed.

For those sensing a tug towards this important ministry, NAMB’s Replant Team has an assessment process to help discern this call. You can take the first step in the process by taking the Replanting and Revitalizing Survey available at namb.net/church-replanting.

The task of replanting churches doesn’t rest solely on the shoulders of replanters. Healthy congregations play a pivotal role in nurturing and supporting struggling churches through the replanting journey. They also serve as incubators for future leaders, equipping and empowering them for the challenges ahead. NAMB has resources for these Kingdom-minded churches to learn more about their vital role in this ministry as well.

Mark Clifton, Executive Director of Church Replanting and Rural Ministry for NAMB is the author of *Reclaiming Glory: Revitalizing Dying Churches*. In the book, he shares different pathways for dying churches, six replanting imperatives and describes in more detail the 13 characteristics of effective Replanters.

Clifton will be preaching at the Oklahoma Baptists’ Pastor’s Conference on Nov. 11. Send Network Oklahoma is sponsoring the luncheon to cap off the Pastor’s Conference, and will feature Clifton and Stewart with opportunities to learn more about church revitalization and replanting strategies and opportunities.
